# Our Mahi



The tamariki (and many of our caregivers) at Homes of Hope are now well into their winter sports season, with some playing Rugby and Netball. Others are doing martial arts, dance and gymnastics which they do throughout the school year. As you can imagine this means a LOT of running around after school and on weekends to practices, games and other activities. Our incredible team do an amazing job of coordinating their transport, and standing on the sidelines to cheer them on for their weekend games, despite the weather getting pretty cold now! Our Child Centred Play Therapy Hub Te Whare Ukiuki, now has capacity for two therapy rooms since relocating to another of our buildings. We are also able to provide whānau support to parents while their tamaiti is in the play room, ensuring a holistic wrap-around service.

Since the relocation and increase in rooms, we have been able to support more tamariki and whānau within our community.

















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
